






KEN FLETT

Beginning their artistic career working behind the scenes in the world of live theatre, they moved towards Embroidery in 2020. Working in the arts has never diminished their love of science or their long-standing love affaire with marine biology and the tiny worlds many folks walk by without notice. These natural inspirations are the focus of much of their work.

In addition to MicroWorlds, past work includes Stranglehold, wearable art pieces inspired by toxic algae blooms, and The Barnacle Project, featured as part of Canada Ocean Week 2025. Current work explores freehand machine embroidery and the use of sustainably foraged plant fibres. They have had works exhibited in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Ontario.

Born in Cuba and now residing in Canada, Silvio Pupo Montero (he/him) studied classical piano for more than 12 years at the Professional School of Music in Holguin, Cuba. 
VIVIAN ZHOU


CREATIVE COMMUNITY IMPACT AWARD

Le Conseil's mission is to foster the preservation and enrichment of the French Acadian language and to safeguard the community's rich cultural heritage through the arts. It ensures growth and visibility of the arts in Nova Scotia; provides artistic education, animation, and dissemination for community members, schools, and the general public; supports the development of local artists, from youth to professionals; promotes cultural accessibility and inclusion, regardless of age, gender or experience; manages key cultural spaces including the Place des arts Père Anselme-Chiasson and the newly established Canton cultural meeting rooms, art gallery and artists studio space.


BLACK ARTIST RECOGNITION AWARD




AQUAKULTRE

Since winning the 2018 CBC Searchlight competition, Aquakultre has released two Polaris-nominated albums and numerous genre-diverse, multi-media collaborations. He presented his debut installation Matriarchs as an Anchor Artist at Nocturne in 2024; he is creator, writer, and host of the TV series GeneratioNS: Black Memories of Nova Scotia, and is currently developing The Aquakultre Project collaboration with the award-winning 2b Theatre. Through all his works, Aquakultre is on a mission to share his love for his unique and beautiful corner of the Black diaspora.


PRIX GRAND-PRÉ




YVETTE d'ENTREMONT

Yvette d'Entremont (she/her) is a renowned multidisciplinary artist from Nova Scotia, celebrated as a singer-songwriter, playwright, producer, documentarian, and dedicated educator. For over 30 years, she has inspired countless students through French, drama, and music, nurturing a deep appreciation for Acadian culture and the arts. Yvette's creative legacy includes three acclaimed albums, more than twenty original plays and musicals, and the award-winning documentary Raconte-moi un souvenir. Her works, such as La voix de la mer and Nelson Dormait, spotlight Acadian history and traditions. Honoured with numerous awards, including Music Nova Scotia nominations and the Hommage en développement culturel from FéCANE, she continues to share her passion both locally and internationally. Yvette's artistry is rooted in her love of language, community, and heritage, making her a vital figure in the preservation and promotion of Acadian and Francophone culture.




MORGAN TONEY

JUNO-nominated Mi'kmaq fiddler and singer, Morgan Toney (he/him), wields music as an almost alchemical force, blending the fiery fiddling of Cape Breton Island with ancient Mi'kmaq melodies, dating back up to 500 years. Through his fusion of Mi'kmaq and Celtic traditions, dubbed Mi'kmaltic, Toney bridges Atlantic music and Mi'kmaq teachings, forging a path where song and fiddle harmonize. His new album ""Resilience"" earned him a 2024 Juno Nomination for Traditional Roots Album of the Year and two 2024 East Coast Music Award wins for Roots/Traditional Recording of the Year and Indigenous Artist of the Year.



CHRISTOPHER WEBB


Christopher Webb (he/him) is a multidisciplinary, self-taught visual artist based in Nova Scotia, Canada. In 2024, he was awarded the CREA – Cantieri del Contemporaneo Venezia Prize for Painting and will present his first international solo exhibition at Marina Bastianello Gallery in Venice in 2026. His work has been exhibited across Canada and internationally, including Contained (Dalhousie University School of Architecture, 2024), Dys(U)topia (CREA Cantieri del Contemporaneo, Venice, 2024), Dominus Vobiscum (Halifax, 2022), and Air Land 4.0 (Turin, 2021).

Beyond his studio practice, Webb has been an artist-in-residence in Canada and Europe, including ARCAC (Annapolis Royal, NS) and Quasi Quadro (Turin, Italy). He is the co-founder of PAVIA Gallery, where he curates exhibitions and directs residencies, and he frequently mentors and lectures. Webb also teaches painting workshops both in his studio in Herring Cove and internationally, bridging practice, pedagogy, and cultural dialogue.




SOLOMON NAGLER

Solomon Nagler (he/him) is a filmmaker, poet and community activist who teaches at NSCAD University. His films have been featured in film festivals across the globe, and retrospective programs of his work have been screened in Germany, Australia, New Zealand, Korea, Japan, France and across Canada. His work also includes 16mm celluloid installations that engage with sculpture and experimental architecture in galleries and public space. He is founder of the Community Mobile Media Lab, a purposedesigned mobile media production hub, which houses film production equipment that can be situated temporarily in Nova Scotia Communities across the province to explore innovative models of co-creation, training and mentorship for populations underrepresented in the film industry. In Halifax, he is a past Board Member of The Atlantic Filmmakers Cooperative, Wonder'neath Art Society and was on the Programming Committee for the Centre for Art Tapes and the Halifax Independent Filmmakers' Festival.

PORTIA WHITE PRIZE




The Portia White Prize recognizes an outstanding professional Nova Scotian artist, who has attained mastery and recognition in their discipline and has made a significant contribution to the province's cultural life over a sustained career.

The primary recipient will receive \$18,000 and a certificate of recognition.

A secondary recipient, who is an emerging Nova Scotia artist or a Nova Scotia cultural organization selected by the primary recipient, will receive \$7,000 and a certificate of recognition.



PORTIA WHITE PRIZE




This prize is named for Portia White, an extraordinary contralto who was born in 1911 in Truro, Nova Scotia. Without any doubt, she is the foremother of contemporary Canadian female singers of any genre. A trailblazing artist, she began her career as a teacher in all Black, segregated schools in the Halifax area, including in Africville and Beechville. Her hard work, dedication and stunning stage presence endeared her to critics and audiences alike. Portia White rose through adversity to achieve international acclaim as a classical singer as she toured extensively across North and South America and the Caribbean. Portia White became a source of pride for Nova Scotians and all Canadians.


JOEL PLASKETT

For over three decades, Joel Plaskett (he/him) has been one of Canada's most inventive and celebrated songwriters. From his early days with Thrush Hermit to his eclectic solo albums and work with The Emergency, Plaskett's music spans heavy riff rock, lo-fi folk, and sprawling concept records like Three (2009), Ashtray Rock (2007), and 44 (2020). His latest, One Real Reveal (2024), strips songwriting to its raw essence. A beloved live performer, he's headlined Massey Hall, collaborated with the NAC Orchestra, and shared stages with Paul McCartney and The Tragically Hip. With JUNOs, ECMAs, and Polaris nods to his name, Plaskett remains rooted in Nova Scotia, recording at his Dartmouth studio Fang, producing for artists like Mo Kenney and Jimmy Rankin, and curating community events like Window Inn Wednesdays. In 2025, his influence was further cemented with Songs From the Gang, a starstudded tribute album featuring Arkells, Sloan, Bahamas, Rose Cousins, and more.

CRESCENDO FEST

Crescendo Fest was created to turn up the volume on African Nova Scotian and Black artists who have long been underrepresented within Atlantic Canada's music scene. Founded in 2023 by Micah Smith, the festival stands as a powerful celebration of Black music, culture, and excellence — a space built by and for our community.

Rooted in Nova Scotia, home to Canada's largest Indigenous Black community, Crescendo Fest is more than a stage — it's a movement. The festival showcases the depth, creativity, and resilience of Black artistry while creating economic opportunities within the community. Whenever possible, Crescendo Fest partners with African Nova Scotian suppliers and highlights Black-owned businesses across Nova Scotia, ensuring that the celebration of Black culture extends beyond the stage.

Since its launch, Crescendo Fest has been recognized for its growing impact, earning consecutive Music Nova Scotia Live Sector Award nominations (2023 & 2024) and the African Nova Scotian Music Association Development Award in 2025.

Crescendo Fest exists to amplify our stories, strengthen our communities, and share the brilliance of Black music with Atlantic Canada and the world.

As a leading live art company in Kjipuktuk/Halifax and beyond, we are committed to playful queer work that is innovative and genre-bending. Our organization has a clear and strong commitment to diversity within culture, abilities and gender. Since our inception in 2016, HEIST has been nominated for over thirty Theatre Nova Scotia Awards and has been awarded eight of them, including Outstanding Production in 2022 with our show Frequencies. HEIST was also a finalist for the Nova Scotia Masterworks Prize in 2021 with their original show The Princess Show. HEIST has toured work across the country, been a part of the National Arts Centre season and was featured at Spotlight Canada in Edinburgh in 2022. HEIST is led by Richie Wilcox (he/they), Aaron Collier (he/him) & Sylvia Bell (she/her).







MARGOT DURLING | GRAPHIC DESIGN

After 20+ years as a Creative Director working behind a desk/mask, Margot (they/them) is now living as an independent artist in Punamu'kwati'jk, Dartmouth. Their award-winning body of work focuses on public art, playgrounds, monuments, community activism, and neurodivergence. Their sculpture 'Chosen Family' on the Halifax Commons celebrating trans liberation, queer kinship, and gender expression has been exhibited at the National Arts Centre and Halifax Mural Festival. Honoured in another life as one of Canada's Top 100 Most Powerful Women, Margot's background in medical design (NSCAD) and industrial design (Germany) led to a career in architecture. Before leaving corporate life in 2022, they led an international team to become runner-up for Canada's 2SLGBTQIA+ National Monument design competition. Margot is now returning to their fabrication, metalsmithing and woodworking background to complete trifecta and build artworks from vision, prototype, to reality.
